## We're Looking For Students Interested In Public Service And Leadership

Students who attend our Zoom sessions in October will have a chance to win AirPods and a \$1,000 college scholarship!

Guided by our cooperative commitment to community, North West REC has a long history of supporting students in the communities we serve through scholarships and leadership opportunities. We've also been sending deserving high school students to our nation's capital every summer for years as part of the national Electric Cooperative Youth Tour program.

lowa's electric cooperatives are pleased to once again offer a virtual opportunity for rural students to learn more about advocacy, electric cooperative career opportunities and the cooperative business model with a three-part webinar series in October. The lowa Youth Leadership Academy is open to any high school student in our service area and they are invited to register at www. lowaYouthTour.com.

"This program is perfect for rural lowa students who have a passion for public service, leadership or government," remarked Lyle Korver, "We want to raise students' awareness of how local electric co-ops power people's lives and empower communities. We also want to talk about exciting cooperative career paths that are available in smaller communities."

Once students register online for the Iowa Youth Leadership Academy, they can attend the webinars from their own computer or mobile device. Each Zoom session will last around 45-60 minutes and focus on a specific topic:

- Tuesday, Oct. 2, 7:00 p.m. Cooperative Business Model
- Thursday, Oct. 14, 7:00 p.m. Advocacy
- Thursday, Oct. 23, 7:00 p.m. Leadership

At the end of each live session, one lucky attendee will be selected at random to win a pair of Apple AirPods. Students who attend all three sessions will be entered into a random drawing for a \$1,000 college scholarship. All students who register online by September 30 will receive a special box of co-op goodies in the mail.

During the Zoom sessions, students will be inspired by our lineup of speakers and

presenters. Participants will learn how to advocate for issues that are important to them and build leadership skills from a motivational speaker. Attendees will also hear about lowa Youth Tour. Students with an interest in government and public service are encouraged to apply for this weeklong trip to Washington, DC. The 2026 Youth Tour is slated for June 14-20 next summer.

Load management is one of the easiest ways for members to become active members in their cooperative and save money on their electric bills. Not only does having a load management switch help qualify you for the interruptible all electric heat rate, it also qualifies you to purchase a Marathon water heater from us at a rebated price! You can save between \$300 and \$500,

depending on which size you purchase, by installing a switch on your water heater. An even bigger bonus, if you are building a new home with all electric heat and have a load management switch installed, you can receive \$1,000 rebate on an 85 or 100 gallon water heater!

## **Local Teens Attend National Tour Program**

Thirty-five high school students sponsored by lowa's locally owned electric cooperatives, including two from North West REC, traveled to Washington, D.C., from June 15-21 for the 2025 Electric Cooperative Youth Tour. The lowa students joined with nearly 2,000 other student leaders from across the nation to learn more about cooperatives and U.S. history and government. lowa's electric cooperatives were the first ones to send students to Washington, D.C., more than 65 years ago; over the decades, hundreds of lowa student leaders have learned about their role as an American citizen through this program.

Tyler Friedrichsen and Elsie Van Beek (pictured left) were the Youth Tour delegates chosen to represent North West REC.

"Youth Tour is a major highlight for many students, and we're proud to send 35 of Iowa's best and brightest to our nation's capital this year to participate," said Shelly York, Youth Tour coordinator at the Iowa Association of Electric Cooperatives. "These students gained a first-hand understanding of the legislative process and made connections with other student leaders from across the country that will last a lifetime."

Students who attended Youth Tour participated



in leadership training, engaged in one-on-one conversations with elected officials, jump started their national peer network, learned about electric cooperatives, and toured the monuments and museums in our nation's capital.

Security lights and maintenance are available to our members at the prices below. We are no longer able to service HPS or mercury vapor lights as we are no longer able to get parts for them. If your old light has an issue, you will need to upgrade to a LED light if you would like us to fix it.

# MANAGER'S Report

## As the Old Saying Goes "Be Careful What You Wish For"

Following the June flooding events of last summer, many of us were starting to have concerns about being back in a drought, as it had become extremely dry last fall and early this spring. Well, as the old saying goes, "be careful what you wish for". June and July have been extremely wet months and as often happens with

summer rains, the storms with strong winds come with it.

I had not heard of a derecho storm until the summer of 2020 when our area was on the edge of the derecho storm that caused widespread damage throughout east central lowa. We were fortunate during that storm, as our system received fairly minor damage. We ended up sending some of our linemen to help REC's in eastern lowa that year as they received significant damage from that event.

This time we weren't quite as fortunate. With nearly 100 mph winds in parts of Sioux County on the evening of July 28, what many are calling another derecho event, we experienced a lot of damage to the northwest

part of our system. We had over 500 members that lost power for anywhere from a few hours to more than a day in a few cases. We don't have a final count yet on the number of broken poles, but as I am writing this article, four days after the storm, we are still working on replacing some of the downed poles and lines.

At times, we need to become a little creative in our storm restoration efforts, as we did with this storm. We actually rented nine portable generators and installed them at some services that may have been out of power for over a week if we had not taken this action. The reason for that is our single-phase line

was under built on another utilities line, and they lost over 75 structures. We weren't able to make our repairs until their contractors completed their repair work. This repair work was continuing four days

after the storm. We appreciate the patience and understanding of our members. I was very proud of our employee team again as all of our departments worked proficiently and professionally together to do whatever it took to get power restored for our members as quickly and as safely as possible. Once again, we saw one of the important benefits we have gained from our consolidations, by being able to bring in crews

quickly and efficiently from other districts where there either wasn't any damage, or the damage was minimal.

Thanks again to our members for your support during these challenging times. We have received a lot of very nice thank you comments from members, either over the phone or on social media. This means a lot to us.



















## **NWREC Members Participate In 36th Energy Trail Tour**

More than 130 electric cooperative member-owners from western and north-central lowa embarked on an educational adventure this summer, participating in three motorcoach tours that showcased the journey from power generation to their homes and businesses. The 36th annual Energy Trail Tour season featured three motorcoach tours departing from Northwest lowa Power Cooperative (NIPCO) in Le Mars, with tours scheduled June 18-20, June 25-27, and July 9-11.

The three-day educational experience took participants through the Dakotas to visit key facilities operated by Basin Electric Power Cooperative and Western Area Power Administration (WAPA), the primary power suppliers for local distribution cooperatives through their generation and transmission partners NIPCO and Corn Belt Power Cooperative.



#### **Tour Destinations and Learning Experiences**

Oahe Power Powerhouse and Dam, Pierre, South Dakota, and Big Bend Powerhouse and Dam, Fort Thompson, SD

Participants explored hydroelectric generation at Missouri River facilities Oahe Dam and Powerhouse (June tours) and Big Bend Dam (July tour), learning about the engineering marvels of the earthen dams that created Lake Oahe, America's fourth-largest reservoir (Oahe), and Lake sharpe (Big Bend). The tours highlight



how hydroelectric power plays an important role in an all-of-the-above energy generation mix.

#### **Antelope Valley Station**

Members toured Basin Electric's coal-fired power plant, including the turbine deck, control room, and boiler areas, culminating with views from the 17th-floor observation deck. The visit showcased the value of coal-fired baseload generation and Basin Electric Power Cooperative's investments in environmental control technologies to reduce emissions.

#### **Coteau Properties Company Freedom Mine**

A drive-through tour of the active surface mine demonstrated lignite coal production and land reclamation efforts. Participants witnessed massive earthmoving equipment in operation at a facility that produces approximately 15 million tons of coal annually while reclaiming about 600 acres of mined land.

#### **Mobile Classroom**

Travel on a motorcoach provides an excellent "overthe-road" opportunity to learn about other generation sources and operations that produce valuable byproducts from the production of synthetic natural gas.



#### **Wind Generation Education**

Participants learned about the role of wind power in America's diverse energy portfolio and its contribution to the country's all-of-the-above energy approach to securing safe, reliable, cost-effective, and sustainable energy production.

#### **Great Plains Synfuels Plant**

Passengers learned how coal is converted into synthetic natural gas as well as produce valuable byproducts including anhydrous ammonia, carbon dioxide, and diesel exhaust fluid through Basin Electric's Dakota Gasification Company subsidiary at the Great Plains Synfuels Plant.

#### **Cooperative Values in Action**

Beyond the technical education, participants gained a deeper insight into the cooperative difference, learning about the history of rural electric cooperatives, the Seven Cooperative Principles, and Touchstone Energy's four service foundations: Integrity, Accountability, Innovation, and Commitment to Community.

The tours combined education with fellowship, creating lasting memories while building appreciation for the complex process of delivering reliable electricity to the communities these cooperatives serve.

#### **Power Supply Information**

NIPCO purchases approximately 80% of its power supply from Basin Electric Power Cooperative and 20% from Western Area Power Administration (WAPA), which markets power generated from the Missouri River Dam System.


